The response was a standing ovation!

I have often quoted a famous Jesuit saying that 'The education of youth is the transformation of the future,' and how true this is in the case of these two young people. But they are not alone. I could recount similar stories about so many of our graduates. They have made their mark in this world; in law, in medicine, in government, in the community and service professions and, most importantly, in education. #### **Busways Update**

Two weeks ago, Mrs Maidens, Mrs Hackett and I met with Mr Ross (a very experienced Busways Inspector) for over an hour, and gave him a copy of each and every piece of feedback (email, typed and handwritten notes from parents and students) from the Xavier community (over 80 individual submissions).

Mr Ross assured us that this information would be sent to head office and each issue would be addressed or at the very least a response given to the request.

No response has been received at this time. I will wait until Monday (10<sup>th</sup> March) to hear a response, and if none is received I will contact the Busways Head Office and request that Mr Ross visit us again to explain why our concerns have not been addressed.

### Quality Catholic Schools Survey (17<sup>th</sup> – 28<sup>th</sup> March)

All Catholic schools in the Diocese of Parramatta will be participating in the Quality Catholic Schooling (QCS) project in 2014.

QCS will provide data from students, staff and parents about our school's cultural behaviour, relationships

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and learning community, the results of which will assist us to focus our efforts for improvement through building on our successes to date.

From March 17<sup>th</sup> to 28<sup>th</sup> all staff and students, as well as 60 randomly selected parents will be asked to complete a survey. Staff and students will complete the survey online at school. Parents will be sent home a paper survey but will also be able to complete the survey online if preferred. The survey will take about 20-30 minutes to complete.

A survey consultant (Insight SRC) has been engaged to manage the data collection. The survey data will be kept strictly confidential and no individual will be identified to the school or the Catholic Education Office. Each school will receive an information report at the end of May and will use this report to inform their planning.

If you are selected to complete the survey, a member of the School Leadership Team will contact you and I would encourage your participation as this will help our school to identify our strengths and areas in which we can focus our improvement.

#### From the Leader of E-Learning

#### Digital Footprints

Last week in my Year 9 Information and Software Technology Course, I introduced my class to the Way Back Machine web site on the Internet. This is an archive of web sites that have been compiled since the mid-1990s and can be found at <u>http://archive.org/web</u> Run by the Internet Archive, a non-profit organisation, the site focuses on preservation and providing access to digital cultural artefacts. By using this web site, students were able to "go back in time" and view their favourite web sites as they appeared years ago. One student thanked me for letting her relive her childhood as she found a website she use to access when much younger! The students saw text and images on these web sites that were still around after all these years.

The activity with the Way Back Machine web site provided the class with much thought in relation to what they have been posting online. It made them think about what they had said online and what photos they had posted. They soon realised that by using a social network such as FaceBook or Twitter for example, they leave behind a digital footprint that could easily be found some years in the future by a potential employer or researcher. They soon realised that every game and app they use or web service they sign up for, has the potential to widen their digital footprint . This digital footprint can then remain with them for life, as evidenced by the reactions from my class when they used the Way Back Machine on the Internet.

By using the Way Back Machine, my class discovered the ongoing issue of *data permanence* and the issue of how we can preserve our reputations in the digital era. Recently, an article appeared in *Wired* magazine that examined the issue of preserving our reputations in the digital era and the need for parents to talk to their children about the digital footprint that they are leaving behind. Of interest, was the following paragraph: "It's always been the case that teenagers in middle school and high school can be pretty brutal to each other. But there used to be a limit to how far an embarrassing situation could travel, and perhaps more importantly, there was little cost, long-term, for these mistakes in the days before data permanence. Few 12-year-olds, posting data online, consider the fact that what they post may be readily accessible when they are 30-year-old (or 30-year-old) ever had reason to think this way before." The simple activity I had completed with my Year 9 class, brought this fact home to them. # From the Leader of Learning

#### Feedback for students and parents

At Xavier we have a commitment to the learning gain of every child. We believe that every child has the capacity to learn and to improve. A fundamental element of achieving our goal is achieved by providing feedback to students and parents; parent-teacher interviews are an important component of this element.

Last week saw the first of our parent-teacher interviews for the year with Year 12 receiving valuable feedback from their teachers. It was pleasing and encouraging to see many of our students and parents in attendance. Parent-teacher interviews are an invaluable experience for students and parents. It is the primary opportunity for you, as parents, to hear the same message as your child in relation to his/her progress, strengths and areas of concern. This communication means that we are all on the same page – parent and child hear the same message and have the opportunity to ask questions to assist learning.

Research by many notable academics, most recently Hattie and Timperley (2007), has proven that feedback, formal and informal, "emphasising learning goals" leads to increased student learning gain; imagine, then the power of feedback when we combine it with parental commitment to the process. Although your child may appear to rile against your "interference" in their education as you supportively encourage them to apply themselves with diligence and sustained effort, enquire about their learning and achievement and attempt to engage in general chit-chat about school, they do appreciate your love and concern, or at least they will in hindsight, and, more importantly, it makes a positive difference to their learning and achievement.

Our next **Parent-Teacher evening** is for **Year 11**, **Monday 31**<sup>st</sup> **March**. I look forward to seeing all our Year 11 students and parents then.

### Ways to Encourage Students to Boost their Academic Results in 2014

By the end of the term, students often find themselves overloaded and overwhelmed, having to rely on cramming for final exams and assessment tasks to get through to the break. They are exhausted and in survival mode. Thriving academically no longer matters. All that matters is the break at the end. If you've ever felt this way, you've experienced what we call the "Cram Cycle."



#### Solution: Break the "Cram Cycle" Before it Starts

Students get busy during the term, which leads to exhaustion. When you're exhausted, the only thing you want to do is zone out for a bit. After an afternoon of zoning, students are forced to put all their effort into completing assignments that are due tomorrow. We call this "cramming." As students work on only that which is due tomorrow, long-term assignments pile up and create even more busyness, which leads to exhaustion, and the "Cram Cycle" begins to accelerate.

Most students only get out of the "Cram Cycle" when the term ends.

But 2014 can be different. If you want to stay out of this dreaded cycle, commit yourself to studying at least five days a week, even when you don't have anything due the next day. Use every day as a review day, spreading out your study sessions for big tests and projects across multiple days instead of letting them pile up. This approach takes more effort initially to create these habits, but you'll reap the benefits when you're free of the "Cram Cycle" and the stress that follows it.
