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From the Principal

Dear Parents, guardians and friends of Xavier,

Last Friday was a timely reminder that we are now entering the bush fire season. The staff and students supported by the NSW Police, NSW Rural Fire Service and Fire Service NSW worked in unison to ensure the safety and wellbeing of all members of our community. It is alleged that the fires were the result of arson that originated some several kilometres from the College on Friday afternoon.

As part of our ongoing policies of ensuring your son and daughter is protected at Xavier College, we have evacuation and lock down drills each term. These drills allow the staff and students to become familiar with both evacuation and lock down procedures. As a consequence of these procedures, you may have observed on both Channel 7 and Channel Ten news (or on our Facebook Page) how well organised and executed our response was to this tremendously stressful and frightening situation. These drills keep us safe.

We are surrounded by the most picturesque rural setting and as such it is incumbent upon each of us to be proactive within the community and report any behaviours or comments we find unusual. Being vigilant and observant has allowed the police to quickly respond to possible suspects associate with this type of arson.

Finally, if your son or daughter is experiencing any anxiety, worry or uncertainty about the impact of the fires, please inform the relevant Dean of House. They we will ensure that appropriate support is provided to your son and daughter. If you would like to chat about the fires on Friday afternoon, please call the College and I will be pleased to meet with you and provide any support you may require.

I have attached the timeline of events and our response during the afternoon. I am very proud of our staff and students who responded responsibly to the directions given to us by the NSW Police. I want to thank the many parents who have emailed a '*thank you*' note to the College. We welcome your kind words and appreciation for just '*doing our job*' of keeping students safe at all times.

2.10pm – A large billow of smoke was visible from the Northern Road end of the school. The fire brigade was contacted who advised that the school was not in danger. We were advised that the fire was in a lot on Vincent Rd and under control.

2.20pm – The wind changed direction. Police attended the scene and commenced closing Northern and Terrybrook Rd. Parents who live on

Vincent Rd arrived to collect their students. Students who were driving were called from class to go to their cars and go home.

2.30pm – All students called to the yard. Police advised via phone that we were not in danger and to proceed with our normal afternoon procedure. (School <u>concludes at 2.40</u>)



2.50pm – Police attended the school and took control of the situation. A decision was made to initiate a procedure to move students to a contained area to increase the effectiveness of communication between staff and students, and their safe movement off the school premises.

Students were moved to the oval and supervised by all available staff. Staff remained at the bus bay to liaise with police. Staff coordinated the movement of students on the oval.

A contingency was put in place that should the fire threaten the school students would be moved to the Xavier Centre and PAS. Should an evacuation have been necessary a decision was made to evacuate to Xavier Rd in the new Jordan Springs development.

An attempt was made to send instructions to parents via Skoolbag and group SMS; however, **<u>phone and Internet lines had been cut</u>**. A message advising parents that students were safe was put on the official school Facebook page.

The school was safe at all times. Parents and buses had access via the eastern end of Ninth Ave. Parents could also access students from Xavier Rd. Staff manned the Xavier Rd gates.

As parents and buses arrived students were moved off the premises in an orderly manner.

We continued to liaise with the police and follow their instructions.

3.20pm – Students were moved to the Xavier Centre out of the sun, with police consent.

3.30 - 4.30pm - 3 buses gained access to the school. Parents continued to pick up their children from the front and back entrances. Once student numbers had reached ~ 50 students remained, staff who needed to leave were dismissed. A head count was taken of remaining staff as requested by police. A roll of remaining staff and students was taken. Students and staff were marked off as they left.

5.10pm – The final student was collected.

Students, staff and the premises were safe at all times. All procedures were coordinated through the police.

5.30pm - The fire was downgraded to act and watch. Two teenagers were arrested for starting the fire.

5.45pm – Observation of the Xavier Property and buildings found that there has been no damage to any aspect of the property. Our lambs and sheep have been relocated to Caroline Chisholm. Animals located on Seventh Ave are all safe – area placed on act and watch. All fire equipment has been checked and is operational. Static Security Guard was engaged for the weekend.

From the Director of Learning and Pedagogy

Reading Bishop Vincent's homily on the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector, in the latest edition of Catholic Outlook, I was struck by his reflection on our need to be humble before God and recognise that our gifts and talents are God's gifts to us; gifts we should use for his glory through the compassion and empathy we show to others. Our intellect and academic achievements are two of the talents and gifts we posses. Every day I am grateful and blessed to be a teacher, because as a teacher I have the opportunity to share my gifts and talents with students, teachers and parents on a daily basis.

As the 2016 HSC concludes and we farewell our Year 12 cohort of 2016 I pray that they receive achievements reflective of their ability and effort, and journey into the world beyond school to share their gifts and talents with others. Similarly, as we welcome our 2017 cohort, I pray that their journey may be fruitful and rewarding, both personally and academically.

Progressive Achievement Test (PAT) – Mathematics

During Weeks 6 and 7, Year 7 – 10 students will complete the second round of PAT Mathematics. Repeating this test allows us to assess student growth and areas of concern in a range of numeracy strands. The data provided in this test is a valuable source of information about students' specific strengths and areas for improvement. In 2017 we will be investigating ways to report these results to parents as a part of our ongoing commitment to transparency in reporting and assessment.

Numeracy Enrichment Programme

Next week a small group of Year 8 students who have demonstrated excellent mathematical skills in NAPLAN, ICAS and course work will be involved in an enrichment programme designed to extend their current skills and concepts in preparation for high levels of mathematics in Stages 5 and 6. Mr Ben Lange, a new member of our Mathematics Faculty, will be working with these students.

Year 8 Targeted Literacy Programme

We are now in our fourth week of the targeted literacy programme and I commend students and teachers on the positive way they have embraced this programme. Currently students are focusing on the skill of sentence construction and understanding the grammatical terms associated with sentences. In and of itself grammar drills are meaningless; but when considered in the context of the art of effective communication, they are invaluable.

Year 10 Assessment

During Week 5, Year 10 will complete formal examinations in a number of subjects. We are introducing the examination structure to Year 10 in preparation for Stage 6. These examinations are a component of their formal assessment for Semester 2. It might be judicious to speak to your children about their upcoming examinations and assessment, and observe their study routine and preparation process. This is a perfect opportunity to assess what they might need to change to ensure success in Stage 6.

Senior Parent-Teacher-Student Conferences

Senior conferences are scheduled for Tuesday and Wednesday in Week 9. Information pertaining to bookings will be available via Skoolbag and the next Companion.

Australian War Memorial Excursion

Xavier College's Year 12 Modern History students visited the Australian War Memorial on October 20th and 21st. These students of modern history are examining World War One for their Core HSC unit, with their study primarily being undertaken through an analysis of sources.

On behalf of the College, students lay a wreath during the Last Post Ceremony at the Pool of Reflection. They also had the opportunity to speak with Ignatian alumni, Brendan Nelson AO, about his role as Director of the War Memorial and his publications on World War One. As part of this excursion, students undertook a lesson on primary sources, examining bias, context, and the documentation of war history. This visit also gave them the opportunity to spend time in the War Memorial galleries, recording primary sources and diorama depictions of major battles; all which they will draw on for their HSC studies in this area.

We would like to thank Mr Wonson and Mr Hackett who gave up their time to support this learning experience. We also appreciate the support of the families of our Modern History students for the opportunity.

Xavier Sporting Blues Awards

Last week, I had the privilege of presenting the first Xavier College Sporting Blues Awards at our College assembly. This is the premier award for students who represent the College through selection into a NSW All Schools or National team (e.g. NSW All School Open Soccer). This Award is also presented to students who represent a sport at a state and/or national level outside of school (e.g. National BMX team). This award acknowledges exceptional talent and commitment to sport.

A student who receives a Xavier Sporting Blue Award will receive the following:

- Framed certificate;
- Sporting Blues Crest and Badge;
- Name on the Xavier Sporting Blues Board (located in the Xavier Centre); and
- Written article and photo placed in the College newsletter.

The first Xavier Sporting Blues Awards were presented to:

• *Chloe Spears* from Year 9.

Chloe went to Queensland earlier this year and competed in the Australian Swimming Titles for the Under 14 5km Open Water Championships. With over 120 competitors in the race, Chloe did extremely well with a time of 1 hour and 12 minutes, finishing 30 in Australia in her age group. Furthermore, Chloe has represented our College at the PDSSSC Swimming Carnivals since Year 7 Her ambition is to achieve a top 10 position in the Open Water Swim and make the Olympic Swimming Team. Congratulations Chloe!

• Braedyn Urban from Year 7.

Braedyn was selected in the Under 13 NSW Ice Hockey team who travelled to Victoria to compete in the National Titles. Being only 12 years old at the time, Braedyn was one of the youngest selected in the age group and played against stronger and taller opposition. After the round matches, Braedyn's NSW team made the semi finals but unfortunately lost to Western Australia in a penalty shootout. Braedyn trains three to four times a week for over an hour each session. His ambition is to make the Australian Ice Hockey team.

• Daniel Brown from Year 9.

Daniel is the current Under 15 World and Australian Champion in two different styles of Karate. Late last year he travelled to the USA and won two World titles. He also went to New Zealand and won bronze in a style of Karate called Kumite, which has now been confirmed as a sporting event at the 2020 Tokyo Olympics. Daniel trains one hour before school and four hours after school, six days a week. His ambition is to make it in the Australian Olympic Team for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.







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• Liam McCann from Year 11.

Earlier this year, Liam was selected in the NSW Under 20's 4x100m relay and travelled to Western Australia for the National Titles. His relay team came first in the final and were crowned Australian Champions. During the National Titles, Liam came 5th in the final of the UNDER 18 200m with a time 22.4 seconds. He also competed in the NSW AllSchools Carnival at Homebush. Liam entered the 100m and 200m, finishing 4th in the 200m (22.07 PB) and 5th100m (10.98 PB). Liam trains 5 times a week for two hours a day and his goal is to make the Australian Athletics Team for the 2020 Tokyo Olympics.

• Rachel Fiutowski from Year 7.

Rachel recently competed in the NSW State Championships for Figure Skating, held at Penrith Ice Palace. In her division, Rachel competed against 16 other girls ranging in different ages. She finished 9th in the State with a score of 23.27. In her routine, Rachel was required to perform four different jumps, two different spins and a step sequence. Leading up to each competition, Rachel trains a minimum of two hours a day, three to four times a week. It is her aim to become a performer for Disney on Ice.
